



# **Telltale Surface on Ocean** Found by Transport Meigs

Searching Vessel Comes Upon Slick on Route of Missing Plane and at Spot Where She Last Made Radio Report

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30 (AP)—A "thick oil area," marking the spot where the Trans-Pacific Hawaii Clipper presumably hit the ocean, was discovered by the army transport Meigs today 500 miles from Manila.

Disappeared Thursday A radio message from the searching transport, intercepted here, told of the discovery of the tell-tale oil slick directly in the line of the Clipper's course when she disappeared Thursday night with 15 men aboard her on a flight from Guam to Manila.

The message, signed by the captain of the Meigs and directed to military headquarters in Manila, said the oilcoated area was about 1500 feet in circumference.
